It is heartening to note the significant improvement in the pace of NQAS certification in the Union Territory. 9.30% of public health facilities have been certified under NQAS as of 30th September 2025, compared to 0% certified public health facility as of 31st March 2025.

- 1. District Hospitals (DHs): 0%

Please refer to my earlier D.O. No. Z.18015/27/2022-NHM-II (Part-2)-Part (1) dated 19th June 2025, regarding the achievement of NQAS certification for public health facilities by December 2026, as communicated vide Union Health Secretary D.O. Letter No. Z-18015/13/2023-NHM dated 3rd February 2024.

It is heartening to see the active participation of the State of Andhra Pradesh in the implementation of NQAS. The State is among the leading performers in terms of NQAS certification. However, it is concerning to note a decline in the pace of certification. As of 30th September 2025, 38.15% of public health facilities have been certified under NQAS, compared to 42% as of 31st March 2025.

The facility-wise certification progress in Andhra Pradesh is as follows:

- 1. District Hospitals (DHs): 92%
- 2. Sub divisional Hospitals (SDHs): 32%
- 3. Community Health Centres (CHCs): 19%
- 4. Primary Health Centres (PHCs): 51%
- 5. Urban Primary Health Centres (UPHCs): 27%
- 6. Ayushman Arogya Mandir Sub Health Centres (AAM-SHCs): 38%



Please refer to my earlier D.O. No. Z.18015/27/2022-NHM-II (Part-2)-Part (1) dated 19th June 2025, regarding the achievement of NQAS certification for public health facilities by December 2026, as communicated vide Union Health Secretary D.O. Letter No. Z-18015/13/2023-NHM dated 3rd February 2024.

It is a matter of concern that the state of Uttarakhand has not shown any significant progress in NQAS certification, which is stagnant at 2% NQAS-certified facilities since  $31^{st}$  March 2025 till  $30^{th}$  September 2025.

The facility-wise certification progress in the state/UT is as follows:

- 1) District Hospitals (DHs): 38%
- 2) Sub District Hospitals (SDHs): 10%
- 3) Community Health Centres (CHCs): 1%
- 4) Primary Health Centres (PHCs): 0%
- 5) Urban Primary Health Centres (UPHCs): 0%
- 6) Ayushman Arogya Mandir Sub Health Centres (AAM-SHCs): 2%

Given the national target to achieve 100% NQAS certification by December 2026, I urge the state/UT to adopt a **mission-mode approach** for accelerating certification across all levels of healthcare facilities. The expected quarterly projection for achieving NQAS certification is enclosed at *Appendix-I* for your reference.

To accelerate progress, the following strategic actions may be recommended:

- 1.Strengthen the State Certification process: Ensure transition to National Certification within six months of State-level certification. Directions have been issued (through a D.O. letter no. Z.15015/32/2025-NHM-I dated July 7, 2025), that upon achieving NQAS State Certification status, 25% of the incentive of the national certification may be claimed by the states upon meeting the predefined criteria to support the gap closure activities.
- 2. Prioritise the healthcare facilities for any of the following:
- i) Kayakalp-incentivised facilities
- ii) LaQshya/MusQan certified facilities
- iii) IPHS compliant (>80% score)
- 3. **100-day mission-mode campaign** with specific targets assigned to the districts and blocks to achieve NQAS certification of AAM-SHC
- 4. Ensure timely recertification of facilities that are deferred or nearing expiry of existing certification.
- 5. Fast-track national-level certification for district hospitals that have already undergone rapid assessments (RA)

6. Efforts should be made to re-apply for National Certification for conditionally certified facilities, as their validity is limited to six months.

7. State to develop policies to engage internal resources such as external assessors, ayushman assessors and internal assessors for gap analysis, capacity building and mentoring.

8. Several government staff who have been sponsored to pursue postgraduate certifications or diplomas from reputed institutes such as TISS, PHFI, IIPH etc, can be deputed to participate in implementation and capacity-building activities.

9. Conduct facility-wise gap assessments to identify bottlenecks and develop time-bound,

resource-backed action plans to address them.

With concerted efforts and strategic planning, the state of Uttarakhand can achieve full NQAS certification and set a benchmark for quality healthcare service delivery across the country.

Please refer to my earlier D.O. No. Z.18015/27/2022-NHM-II (Part-2)-Part (1) dated 19th June 2025, regarding the achievement of NQAS certification for public health facilities by December 2026, as communicated vide Union Health Secretary D.O. Letter No. Z-18015/13/2023-NHM dated 3rd February 2024.

It is heartening to note the significant improvement in the pace of NQAS certification in the state/UT as 43.93% of public health facilities have been certified under NQAS as of 30th September, 2025, compared to 38% as of 31st March 2025.

The facility-wise certification progress in state/UT is as follows:

- 1) District Hospitals (DHs): 100%
- Sub District Hospitals (SDHs):59%
- 3) Community Health Centres (CHCs): 43%
- 4) Primary Health Centres (PHCs): 3%
- 5) Urban Primary Health Centres (UPHCs): 36%
- 6) Ayushman Arogya Mandir Sub Health Centres (AAM-SHCs): 47%

Given the national target to achieve 100% NQAS certification by December 2026, I urge the state/UT to adopt a mission-mode approach for accelerating certification across all levels of healthcare facilities.
